### **Pride Month**

June is recognized as LGBTQ+ (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer) Pride Month to commemorate a tipping point in history — the **Stonewall Uprising**, which lasted 6 days in Manhattan in June 1969 as police clashed with LGBTQ protesters.

"Pride" itself does not stand for anything, but the word is an integral cultural concept within the LGBTQ+ community which comprises several identities related to sexual orientation and gender identity. It represents solidarity, collectivity, and identity as well as resistance to discrimination and violence.



# **Student Spotlight - Joshua Aggrey**



Meet Joshua Aggrey, Graduate Student, Standaert Lab, Department of Chemistry. Below Joshua shares the impact his experience at ETSU has had on his education and research.

The Office of Equity and Inclusion at East Tennessee State University (ETSU) has played a pivotal role in shaping my academic and professional journey. Their support has been invaluable, consistently assisting with the payment of my program fees, which has significantly eased my financial burden. Recently, their commitment was further demonstrated when they fully sponsored my trip to New Orleans, where I had the opportunity to present my research at the prestigious American Chemical Society meeting.

This kind of support not only facilitated my direct engagement with the broader scientific community but also enhanced my educational experiences by providing opportunities that may have otherwise been

inaccessible. The office's dedication to fostering an inclusive and supportive environment has profoundly impacted my time at ETSU, enabling me to pursue my academic goals with greater confidence and fewer barriers.

My research project is centered on developing innovative methods to enhance the resilience of microbial membranes to solvent stress, a crucial factor in biofuel production. I received an awarded for my presentation at the spring 2024 Appalachian Student Research Form. My presentation detailed my efforts to devise strategies that bolster microbial membrane robustness against these solvents. The ultimate goal of my work is to enable more efficient production of biofuels from plant materials. This research aligns with global needs for sustainable and renewable energy sources, addressing both technological and environmental challenges in the field.

Embracing the role of a graduate teaching assistant here at ETSU has profoundly influenced my academic and professional perspective. Many of my students suffered from learning and attention deficits, something I also had trouble with when I was younger. This role provided a unique opportunity to develop and refine teaching strategies that addressed diverse learning needs, enhancing student engagement and comprehension. The joy of transforming students' apprehension into confidence reaffirmed my commitment to education.

Teaching at ETSU has been a chance to empathize with students from varied backgrounds and tailor educational approaches to individual learning styles. This experience has cemented my desire to pursue a career in academia, where I could foster an appreciation of chemistry among future generations. I received the Outstanding Teaching Assistant award for my outstanding performance as a teaching assistant.

If I were to give any advice to other students who aspire to excel in research or academic endeavors I would say choose a research area that truly interests you. Passion is a significant motivator and can sustain one's enthusiasm and commitment even during challenging times. When you are genuinely interested in your work, it can lead to more innovative and impactful research. Also, being persistent and resilient is key. Research can be filled with setbacks and challenges. Persistence is key to overcoming these obstacles. Learn from failures and view them as steps towards your ultimate goal. Resilience will allow you to navigate the ups and downs of academic and research careers. Finally, seeking help when you're unsure about something. It's often tempting to rely solely on instinct, but this can sometimes lead to preventable mistakes. By asking for assistance or clarification, you access valuable insights and experiences from others who might have faced similar challenges or who possess expertise that complements your own.

This approach not only enhances one's understanding but also strengthens one's decision-making process, helping to avoid pitfalls that could be otherwise missed. Moreover, acknowledging that you don't have all the answers—and are willing to learn from others—demonstrates humility and openness, qualities that are highly respected in any field. ~ Joshua Aggrey

#### Juneteenth - Dr. Elwood Watson

Black Americans are a community of people that have endured abominable levels of trials, abuse and tribulations. The experience of Black America has been one that includes rivers of blood, mountains of sweat and countless number of anguished tears. A community that has suffered indescribable degrees of mistreatment. As a Black American, I am descended from a people for whom the history of slavery, lynching, segregation, black codes, poll taxes, oppressive sharecropping systems and Jim Crow laws are historical facts deeply etched in the fabric of history.

As a scholar who is a historian by training, I am deeply and deftly acquainted with historical literature relating to Black American history and have intensely researched the harrowing accounts of the middle passage and other inhumane incidents, as they related to the rapacious institution of slavery. My ancestors were brought to America as slaves. I can only begin to imagine the sadistic and inhumane treatment they endured.

Thus, Juneteenth is a celebration acknowledging the ending of slavery in the United States. On June 19, 1865, Major General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas, and announced that all slaves were free. Later that year, on Dec. 6, the 13th Amendment <a href="https://constitution.congress.gov/constitution/amendment-13/">https://constitution.congress.gov/constitution/amendment-13/</a> was ratified by Congress, legally and officially ending slavery in the United States.

President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on Jan. 1, 1863, and many slaves had been freed for more than two years, even though in the cradle of the slave-holding confederacy such a truth refused to be recognized. Contrary to the newly freed slaves, many slave owners and other proponents of the slave system were likely shedding more than a few tears.

The purpose of Juneteenth is to acknowledge the atrocities of the past, and to educate

current and future generations of people from African descent about the struggles of Black Americans to ensure it will never be forgotten that we as Black Americans were once considered human property, and to celebrate our liberation from bondage. Juneteenth also serves as a holiday to raise the level of consciousness and to educate Americans of all racial and ethnic groups about slavery in the United States.

Black Americans have long been on the frontline for freedom from racial tyranny. We have been the victims of centuries of discrimination, racial hatred, state-sanctioned violence, a fiercely hostile criminal justice system and numerous other indignities, impositions, and injustices. It is due to this confluence of scurrilous factors that we recognize the necessity of acknowledging a holiday that pays homage to one of the most pivotal moments in the history of Black America, as well as American history in general. Its roots in the reflection of the past offer valuable learning experiences and the opportunity for racial healing.

Today, in 2024 Black America, an America in general has witnessed increasingly accelerated and acute attacks on racial diversity, reproductive rights, marginalized populations and voting rights. The increasing rise of White Supremacy. Black history is being erased from our textbooks. Public schools have become more segregated than they were in the late 1960s. Numerous other inequalities threaten to erode, if not outright erase the gains that were achieved over the past half century.

As we celebrate Juneteenth on June 19th, we must keep in mind that the ideas and promises of freedom alone are not enough to either sustain or propel us. We must celebrate the holiday in the years to come with the unrelenting intent to overturn the pervasive inequality that remains with us long after that liberating day in June 1865.




