What is ideology?



Set of beliefs, value systems, and understandings of a social group

Beliefs, values, and ways of understanding that guide policy formation in any society and that intends to explain and justify society's institutions and social arrangements

Dominant societal ideology might not be held by all



An Uncomfortable Question

When there is a dominant social ideology, exactly can group maintain power of thought, expression, and will especially when they promote ideas, structures, practices, etc..., that are often times is at odds with the wellbeing of the average person?



Simple Definition

Hegemony

the social, cultural, ideological, or economic influence exerted by a dominant group

(https://www.merriam-webster.com/dictionary/hegemony)

Hegemony Theory

Dominant (uncontested) ideology justifies positions, ideas, systems, process, curriculum, etc.

Public is socialized into accepting views through schooling, media, workplace

Dominant ideology can serve to limit discussion/debate and promote acceptance of the status quo



Simple Idea: The Blind Spot



When dominant social groups/cultures benefit from an ideology, education can produce a blind spots

Cultural hegemony = consent to maintain the status quo

Well meaning individuals unintentionally perpetuate oppressive/exclusionary practices

Guided Conversations Through Ideological Diversity based on Inclusive Deliberation

Inclusive Deliberation

Is NOT dogmatic ranting
Is NOT acceptance of all ideas
(attempting to create conflictfree community)

(Remember – uncomfortable is okay)

Inclusive Deliberation

"...where marginalized voices are encouraged to speak, listening is generous, students have studied the alternatives they are weighing, claims are supported with evidence and reasoning, and a rich inventory of historical, scientific, and literary knowledge is brought to bear." (Walter Parker)
