


# Age of Tennessee RNs


In Tennessee, the proportion of younger RNs (34 or younger) decreased, while those aged 35 to 44 increased significantly.


A similar trend is observed for APRNs, with declines in the younger cohort and increases in middle-aged groups.

These patterns suggest an aging workforce across nursing roles, with younger professionals becoming less represented.




















## NP Nurses in Tennessee: An Age Group Analysis
